

## Belgrade 360 DECK

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**Belgrade 360 Observation Deck**, the city's newest tourist attraction, is located on the 41st floor of Kula Belgrade, offering visitors a completely new perspective of Serbia's capital.

From the top of the tallest building in Serbia and the region, guests can enjoy an impressive, unobstructed 360-degree panoramic view of the city skyline. Situated 155 meters above ground level, the observation deck is the perfect place to explore Belgrade and discover its many hidden corners.

Belgrade 360 Deck is not just an observation point - it is an interactive experience that reveals the city's rich culture and history. Specially designed kaleidoscopes present engaging, interactive stories about Belgrade's landmarks and hidden gems. After the panoramic tour, visitors can browse the gift shop and purchase authentic souvenirs inspired by Belgrade and its tallest landmark, Kula Belgrade.

Access to Belgrade 360 Deck is from the second floor of Galerija Belgrade (Entrance 1, Elevator Lobby A), where the ticket office is located. This area also features a selfie station, offering an ideal opportunity to take photos with a pre-selected background.

A glass-enclosed pedestrian skywalk, featuring quotes by Momo Kapor and verses by Dušan Vasiljev, connects Galerija and Kula Belgrade and leads to the elevator lobby. From there, a high-speed elevator takes visitors to the observation deck in just 25 seconds.

Visitors can make a full circle and enjoy views of the city from every direction, either through the glass façade or with the help of telescopes. One of the most striking sights from Kula Belgrade is the very scene that inspired by its design, the confluence of the Sava and Danube rivers, complemented by the historic Belgrade Fortress. The view continues along the Danube and its meanders, across Dorćol, all the way to Pančevo. From the deck, visitors can also see iconic landmarks such as the Temple of Saint Sava and the Avala Tower. The impressive panorama further includes the green slopes of Košutnjak, the Ada Bridge, the lower course of the Sava River, and New Belgrade.
